

D12: MLA-Style Editorial Persuasive Research Paper

(200 pts total possible – 1st Draft (50 pts) Due: D17; 2nd Draft (50 pts) Due: D19 - Final (100 pts) Due: D22)

a) Use the Internet to **find information about one a controversial topic that is of personal interest to you:**

- If you need some ideas, see www.procon.org, or, if you want to research something that will **possibly be one of our topics for our debate**, pick one of the following here: <https://goo.gl/k5pcB7>

b) **After reviewing your chosen issue, I'd like you to pick a side.** This needs to be *your* opinion. **What conclusion(s) have you come to?** How do you support your conclusion(s)? **Why should others agree with you?** Make sure that you use a **thesis statement**, address **conclusions** you have made, and have a **concluding paragraph** that ties all of your conclusions together.

c). **Remember: Write an original report in your own words.** Make sure that you understand plagiarism in all its forms so you don't accidentally plagiarize in this work. (Plagiarism includes not quoting sources of your info, so cite your sources!)

d) **Use any appropriate vocabulary terms from this unit for the report.** This report should be three or more pages in length: 12 pt Times New Roman typed pages (600-1000 words), a Works Cited page and use in-text citations. Title your report: **"Insert Catchy Name Here"**

Please see: <https://goo.gl/mKUnSx> or review the **example essay** on the class website if you are not familiar with MLA / APA format citations. Also, please use a **12 pt Times New Roman font**. Be ready to first **submit the written report on D17, present a draft on D19, and the final presentation on D22.**

Come looking **professional** and ready to wow us.

Write or type the essay and edit so as to be free of spelling and punctuation errors. Using a **word processor / Google Docs** will be the best way to accomplish this.

e) Grading

Your report will be based on the grading criteria listed below. It will be broken into categories that can be viewed in the rubric:

- Is the major idea **clear** and **easily identified** in the introduction? Are all ideas or terms well defined?
- Is the essay plainly divided into **at least five major sections:** introduction (one paragraph), body (three or more paragraphs), and conclusion/summary (one paragraph.)?
- Is the supporting information **organized effectively** and tied in to the main idea?
Is the major idea **backed up** by **accurate information** and is the **information credible**?
- Does the conclusion sum up the essay well and make a strong final statement?
- Is the **Works Cited** page adequate and documented **accurately**? You may use either APA or MLA citations, in case you prefer one or the other. The **essay** format however will follow **MLA guidelines**.
- Do you understand **MLA / APA format** and are you following it **correctly**? Are there in-text citations to show where the information was taken from? (See the citation URLs below)
- Was your presentation persuasive and professional? Was it enjoyable to read / listen to?

Editorial message is somewhat clear, but not very powerful or strong. Info is vague / not terribly convincing. Organization is lacking, and claims are underdeveloped.
