## T2D1, Part III - Colonial Apprenticeship Display Board Project

(100 pts; Draft Due T2D4; Final T2D5)

Now, as you are studying an occupation and starting to create a presentation / poster on, make sure that you complete the following questions checklist by answering the following somewhere in your project:

- What are apprenticeships? Summarize how these work, who did them, why, etc.\* (see: <u>https://goo.gl/VToZFp</u> for more general apprenticeship info, or use the info from your previous homework) \*Note: This section should make up about 1/3<sup>rd</sup> of your project
- What is the occupation that you chose to highlight? What do they do?
- Why was there a need for this occupation? Do we still have this job (or a form of it) today?
- Share at least 3 intriguing things you learned about this occupation in a "Did You Know?" type section
- Include any additional interesting / noteworthy info you learned.

Make sure to check the backside for all other details on grading. You **will be** presenting your project to your peers and the public, so be ready to **share** (2-3 minutes of good info, with some things **not on your board**) what you learned, and be ready to answer any questions. Also, do not forget to **source your info / pictures, etc. with specific URLs, etc.** (put on the backside, or on a separate paper). Good luck! *(Presenting: Nov. 8<sup>th</sup> 4:30-5:30PM)*
